

Montana Oral Health Foundation Presents \$25,000 Check to Great Falls College MSU Dental Hygiene Expansion Project

On September 24, 2021, Great Falls College MSU celebrated a ribbon-cutting ceremony for its expanded dental clinic, allowing the dental hygiene program to accept an additional seven students into the program each year. In addition, there will be increased capacity for dental assisting students, who take the program online and then come to Great Falls every few weeks to do their clinicals.

In November 2020, MOHF pledged to provide \$25,000 to the College to fund equipment in a new operatory that the Foundation will name. The campaign generated \$20,822! A portion of the donations came in as part of the annual dues renewal process, \$5,160 from firsttime donors and \$4,662 from recurring donors. In addition to that

amount, MOHF would like to thank the following major

The newly remodeled facility was operational at the beginning of the Fall semester.

A Message from Your President

I am currently watching my son's basketball practice. happy to be home from my trip to Las Vegas. The first annual SmileCon was the ADA's reimagined annual convention. The opening session was all Las Vegas: 8 am, neon lights, and a drum core to kick off an incredible motivational speaker. Michelle Poler spoke of her 100 days without fear project, a social movement empowering followers to step outside their comfort zone and tap into their full potential. It was a great message that allowed for introspection on what fears are holding us back, whether it be in our practices or our personal lives.

Fast forward to the end of the week, and the business of the house concluded. As a first-time alternate delegate, I didn't understand how the ADA House of Delegates accomplished business until I was immersed in it. First, resolutions are proposed, vetted by reference committees, and approved by the House of Delegates. Then, these resolutions are adopted as ADA policy. A realtime example of how these policies are used is the Medicare debate currently happening in congress. The ADA House created a policy on Medicare dental benefits several years ago

and has been used by ADA lobbyists on our behalf so that we could hit the ground running and gain traction with legislators. It's a streamlined process that gives us a voice and the ability to act quickly.

The candidates for president-elect and second vice president campaigned during the week as well. The common themes of these campaigns were membership, workforce shortages, and the Medicare dental benefit. I think we are all feeling the effects of workforce shortages. I don't know how many dentists I have spoken with recently

> that have commented that they have had an ad out for a hygienist or an assistant for six or more months. These shortages affect our ability to care for our patients promptly, and I fear the long-term repercussions of these shortages.

> Knowing that the ADA is looking at solutions to help solve workforce shortages is critical. Your leadership within the MDA is also brainstorming ideas and solutions for these workforce issues, but these solutions may take time to implement.

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ADA House of Delegates Passes Resolutions Addressing Workforce Shortages and Reinstating Third-Party Payer Concierge Services

The American Dental Association House of Delegates met October 13-16 in Las Vegas, Nevada. Our delegates represented Montana dentists, Drs. Jane Gillette and Kurt Lindemann, and alternate delegates, Drs. Ingrid McLellan and Jason Tanguay. The House grappled with many issues facing dentistry today and passed resolutions that will positively affect Montana dentists.

Workforce issues were a recurrent theme in both speeches given by officers and private conversations among dentists in attendance. As a result, the House passed resolution 86RC with four parts to help address the dental team workforce shortage experienced nationwide. The first part calls on the ADA to distribute existing print and social media communications materials to state and local dental societies to use to promote and encourage middle and high school students to consider careers in dentistry, dental hygiene, and dental assisting. The next

BSCC continues to make great progress with 25+ Montana health care organizations (100+ sites) now live on the Health Information Exchange (HIE) and 83 signed participants representing over 300+ sites. BSCC is currently in the process of onboarding various healthcare facilities in MT so providers can have timely access to their Patient's comprehensive, longitudinal record in the statewide HIE, including demographics, medication history, diagnoses, procedures, encounters, allergies, lab results, and radiology results.

Working Behind the Scenes—Your MDA Standing Committee Volunteers

Your volunteer committee members diligently work overtime to carry out the MDA mission outlined in the Constitution, Bylaws and Strategic Plan.

The **Board of Directors** acts as the governing body of the Association. District Directors are as follows: First District, Dr. Mike Bowman; Second District, Dr. April Foster; Third District, Dr. Julie Strong; Fourth District, Dr. Steve Spencer; Fifth District, Dr. Mari Kiesling; Sixth District, Dr. Ryan Wallis; Seventh District, Dr. Jerry Martin; Eighth District, Dr. Matt Moen; Ninth District, Dr. Wade Wilde; Tenth District, Dr. Matt Caulkins. We are still looking for a New Dentist Representative. Directors are appointed by their district and serve three-year terms, with a two-term limit. The Board meets three times each year, and members usually serve on committees as well.

The **Executive Committee**, commonly referred to as ExCom, acts in the Board's capacity when not in session and reviews the management of the central office. This year's Executive committee consists of President, Dr. Ingrid McLellan; President-elect, Dr. Ron Davis; Vice-President, Dr. Will Samson, and Immediate Past President, Dr. Jason Tanguay. These offices are all oneyear terms. Our Delegates are Dr. Jane Gillette and Dr. Kurt Lindemann, serving staggered three-year terms. Treasurer, Dr. Greg Seaman, is serving his first three-year term. ExCom, Delegates, and the Treasurer are elected by the General Assembly at our annual meeting.

The **Financial Oversight Committee** reviews the financial position of the Association and oversees the budget process. It is comprised of members-at-large and EXCOM members; MDA's Treasurer is the chair. They meet quarterly and more frequently during the budget process.

The **Government Affairs Committee** studies and develops recommendations on legislation and state and national issues related to dentistry. It is comprised of members-at-large and EXCOM members. They meet monthly during non-legislative years and weekly during the legislative session.

The **Membership Committee** recommends recruitment and retention goals and assesses and recommends member benefits and services. It is comprised of members at large. They meet at least three times per year.

The **Dental Health and Access Committee** formulates plans and recommends policies concerning dental health, preventive dentistry, and access to dental care. It is comprised of members at large. They meet monthly.

The **New Dentist Committee** formulates and proposes practical and feasible activities related to new dentists in making the transition to active membership and participating in organized dentistry and to provide insight into trends, needs, interests, and issues of the new dentist in Montana. It is comprised of New Dentists from each district, and the New Dentist Board Member is chair. They meet at least three times per year.

The **Continuing Education Committee** reviews and recommends continuing education speakers, considering each speaker's financial impact and program quality. It is comprised of members at large. They meet when necessary.

part is to study the issue of dental hygienist and dental assistant employment tenure to determine variables that lead to attrition and high employee turnover, as well as variables that encourage long term employees. The research will be used to develop a toolkit that dentists can use to help increase the tenure of dental team members. The next section calls on the ADA to meet with ADEA (American Dental Education Association) and collaborate in conducting a study of accredited dental hygiene and assisting programs and formulate ideal enrollment recommendations by state and or region and make this information available to state and local dental societies, as well as dentistry, hygiene and assisting education administrators. The final part directs the ADA to investigate financial incentives, such as possible tax abatements and grants, to motivate educational institutions to create or expand existing dental hygiene and dental assisting programs to expedite the workforce issue's resolution.

Another resolution that Montana dentists will find to be of benefit was resolution 88 — Reinstatement of ADA Third-Party Payer Concierge Service. Do you wish there was a free concierge service you could call with insurance questions or issues? Well, there was, and then it went away, but it is back by popular demand! Here are the sorts of things this service can help you with:

- Providing guidance in the appeals process when a claim has been denied.
- Contacting dental plans to revise explanation of benefits language that impugned on the dentist-patient relationship.
- Connecting individual dentists with a dental plan's consulting dentist.
- Clarifying requirements on electronic fund transfer payments.

Throughout the year, MOHF distributed \$5,500 in scholarships to dental hygiene and dental assisting students. Below are the recipients' photos and thank you notes.



Half a Loaf? Low-Income Seniors Only Get One Thin Slice of Medicare Dental Benefit

An op-ed from ADA Past President, Dr. Klemmedson, has been published in the Hill

There's a saying: "Half a loaf is better than none." Under Congress's current Medicare dental benefit proposal, lowincome seniors don't get half a loaf, they barely get a slice.

If you think of the proposed dental benefit in simple terms-as a loaf of bread-Congress is trying to slice it so it feeds all Medicare-eligible seniors. The problem is that each slice is so thin that everyone goes hungry. Middle or high-income seniors have the means to buy extra bread (dental benefits), but what about low-income seniors? For them, that thin slice of bread is all they have.

I applaud Congress for recognizing that oral health is integral to overall health. Now is the time for them to consider who needs a dental Medicare benefit the most.

By and large, thanks to good oral hygiene, a healthy

diet, avoidance of tobacco products and regular dental visits, Americans' oral health has greatly improved over the decades. Yet for low-income seniors who may rarely see a dentist, it is a far different story. According to the American Dental Association's Health Policy Institute, 26 percent of Medicare beneficiaries do not seek dental care because they cannot afford it. Over time, a lack of care can result in multiple oral health problems which can also greatly impact overall health.

As a dentist and a physician, I see firsthand the tragic consequences of severe dental disease-people in severe pain seeking dental care in hospital emergency departments, people unable to have organ transplant

Dr. Linda Edgar ('92), one of our school's most prominent alumnae, will seek the presidency of the American Dental Association, she has disclosed.

"I decided to run for ADA president about a year ago," Dr. Edgar told the *Dental Alumni News* in late July. "I had several past ADA presidents encourage me to run for this position since I started as trustee in 2018." She discussed her plans with dental community leaders in her district and they voted to support her candidacy, she said. Dr. Edgar will officially announce her candidacy at the ADA House of Delegates meeting Oct. 13-16 in Las Vegas, and the election for president-elect takes place in October 2022. If she wins, she will be ADA president in 2023-24.

Dr. Edgar has already served as a national dental officer, holding the presidency of the Academy of General Dentistry (AGD) from 2013 to 2014. She also served as AGD past president, president-elect, and vice president (2011-15) and served two terms as national secretary (2007-2011). The experience, she said, gave her eight years leading at the national level. She also met leaders from all the other dental specialty organizations and officials with the U.S. Department of Education and the federal Health Resources & Services Administration.

"I believe collaboration is very important, and I know it can move dentistry forward into more new and innovative programs and ideas," she said.

She is a forceful proponent of continuing education and holds an AGD mastership in recognition of more than 2,000 hours of postdoctoral course work. "I had a vision in 1995 to start an educational group to help dentists further their education and become more successful," she said. "The AGD has taken that first study club dream and turned it into a Global Education Center with 12 chairs where they do hands-on supervised CE and treat the underserved at the same time." She also has a master's degree in education and said she knows that helping dentists further their skills after dental school is paramount to their success.

As an ADA trustee, she said, "we have been working on issues I feel are vital to dentists' success. One is insurance legislation to help patients and dentists. Our District XI brought a resolution to the ADA in 2018 to allot money for states to help with better insurance transparency and fairness. That passed as a pilot program in 2018, and now more than 31 states have insurance legislation that has helped members. This has been one of the most successful resolutions I have seen create a difference for dentists."

She is also a member of the ADA's Business Innovation Committee, which has developed a coding course to help dental office front desk staff get better reimbursement. "I am passionate about creating actual dollar value for members," she said. She will chair the committee next year and will direct efforts to help ADA members realize more savings: "I want ADA members to be able to say, 'Now, that program saved me a lot of money.' "

If she becomes ADA president, she said, "I would like to do something about the excessively

high student loan percentages that are presently charged. If we are creative, I think we can do something about this problem."

Another area of focus would be addressing the country's dental workforce shortage. "With my education background" – she taught high school and junior high in Auburn, Wash., for 14 years before starting dental school – "I would like to see ADA be more proactive helping young people and diverse groups choose careers in dentistry."

She cited other issues:

- "I am also very frugal with members' money, and as Budget and Finance [Committee] chair" –she will assume that post next year, on top of her Business Innovation duties – "will continue to work to develop new non-dues revenue opportunities while still being generous with ADA service. We need to keep our membership dues as low as possible and be efficient so we can still provide exceptional service to each member."
- "I want all our members to feel special and listened to and connected."
- "We have started investing in digital transformation to use artificial intelligence to meet our members' individual needs for help and information. I would like to see this through."
- "I would also like to see collaborations between specialty groups and general dentistry groups to help each other."

"These are only a few of the reasons I have chosen to run," she said. "There are many, many more."

Dr. Edgar and her husband, Dr. Bryan Edgar ('76), practiced together in Federal Way, Wash., for 27 years before retiring in 2020. They have been two of our school's most visible ambassadors and supporters, co-chairing our successful "Campaign UW: Creating Futures" from 2000 to 2008 and serving as Dean's Club co-presidents. Their

surgery because the infection in their mouths can spread throughout their bodies, and people who have lost all of their natural teeth. These are just a few examples.

That is why the American Dental Association believes policymakers should provide a comprehensive dental benefit to nearly half of all Medicare-eligible seniorsthose with incomes of approximately \$38,000 each (up to 300 percent of the federal poverty level).

Comprehensive Medicare dental coverage means providing low-income seniors with a full range of affordable dental services they need to have a healthy mouth...to get them out of chronic pain and be able to comfortably eat and sleep. little less conversation and a little more action. I think I have the leadership skills developed over the last 25 years in dentistry to help pick the best teams to make things happen for our patients and our dentists."

Concentrating Medicare benefits on low-income seniors will help improve health equity. Approximately 67 percent of Hispanic seniors and 70 percent of Black seniors have incomes below 300 percent of the federal poverty level. Achieving health equity is a goal of the Biden administration according to HHS Secretary Xavier Becerra.

Why not provide a dental benefit to all Medicare beneficiaries? For one good reason:

The current House bill does not help those who need it the most, and that is a tragically missed opportunity. The proposed dental benefit in the House bill imposes

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

The main question is whether you, and they, understand the security of their services, actual requirements of HIPAA compliance and how those impact your overall security and revenue. high patient co-pays. That thin slice of dental benefit bread gets even thinner. For low-income seniors, who often must choose between food and housing, the high Medicare co-pays for major dental procedures will make access to dental care unattainable.

Congress has a simple choice. Provide a meager dental benefit to all Medicare patients, rich and poor alike, or provide low-income seniors with a comprehensive affordable dental benefit that will significantly help those in need.

Let's hope that Congress makes the right choice.
